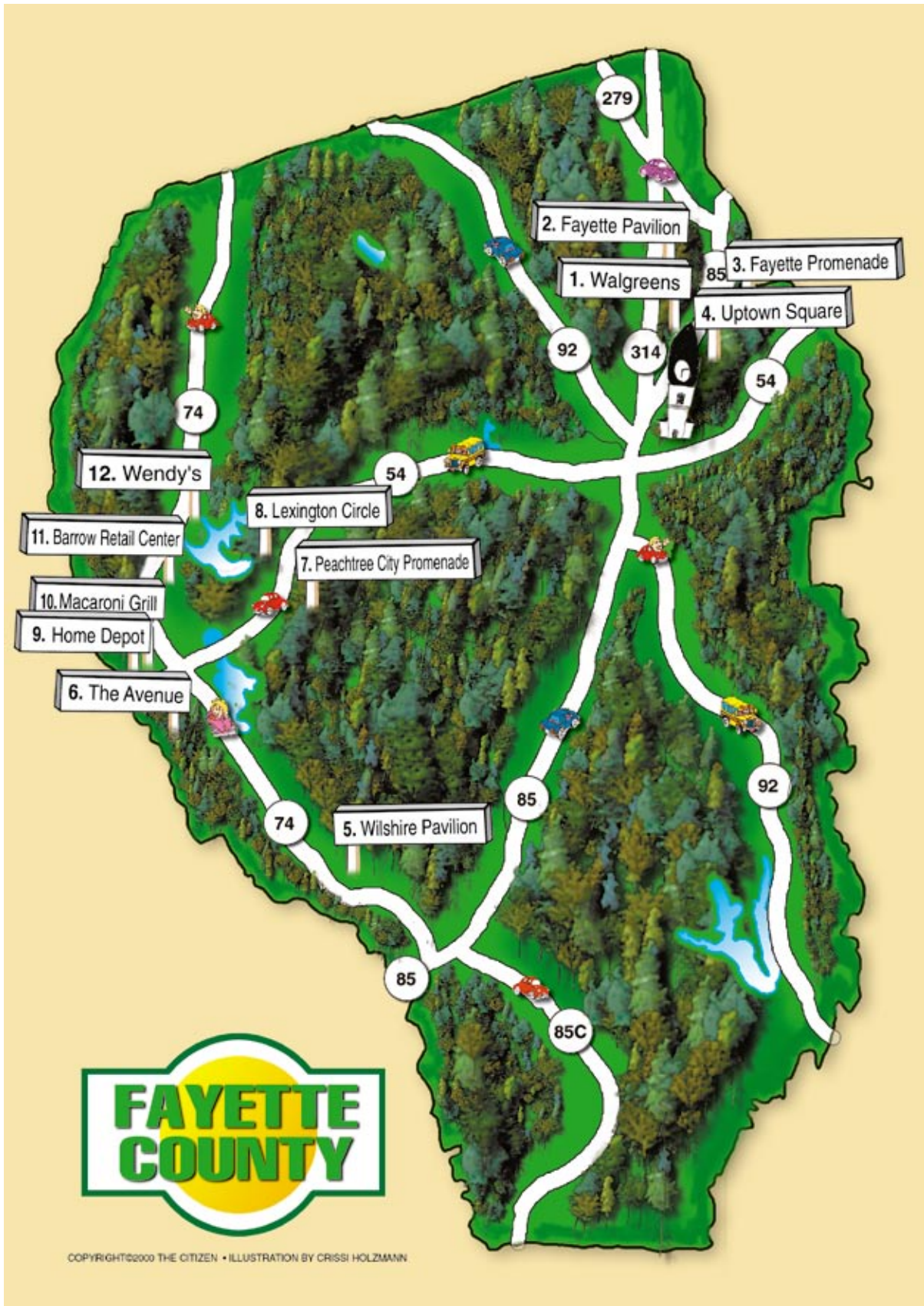
**HWY. 54 ROAD WIDENING**

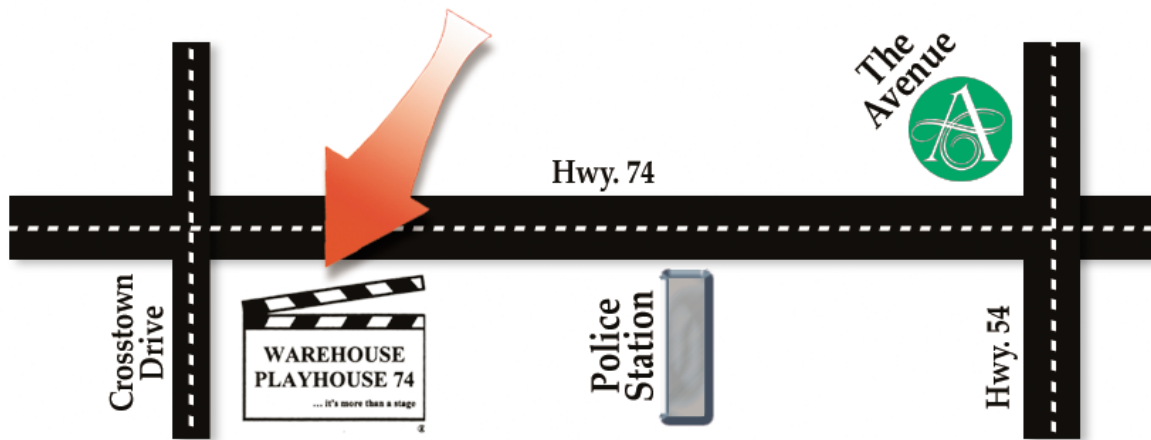

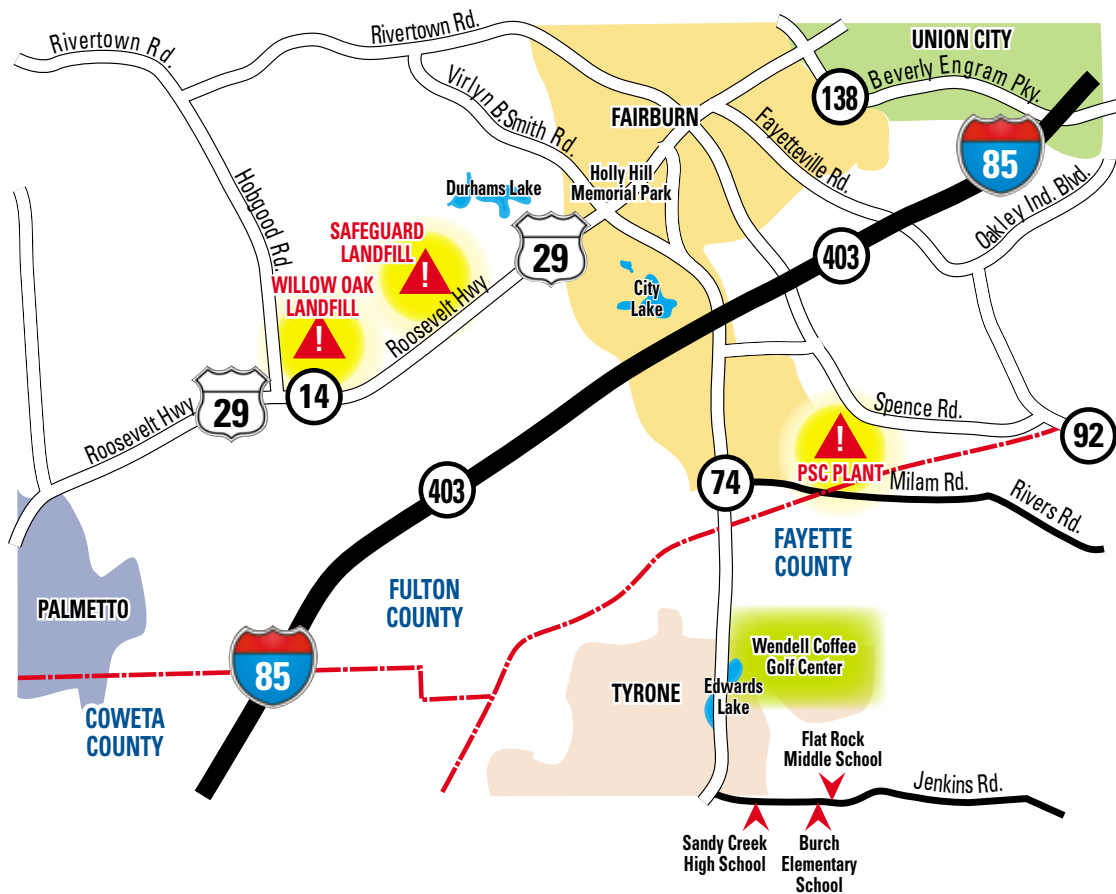

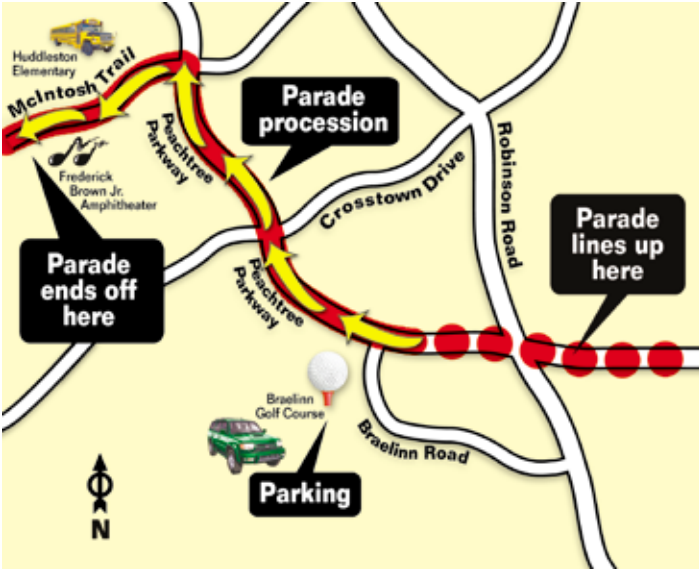

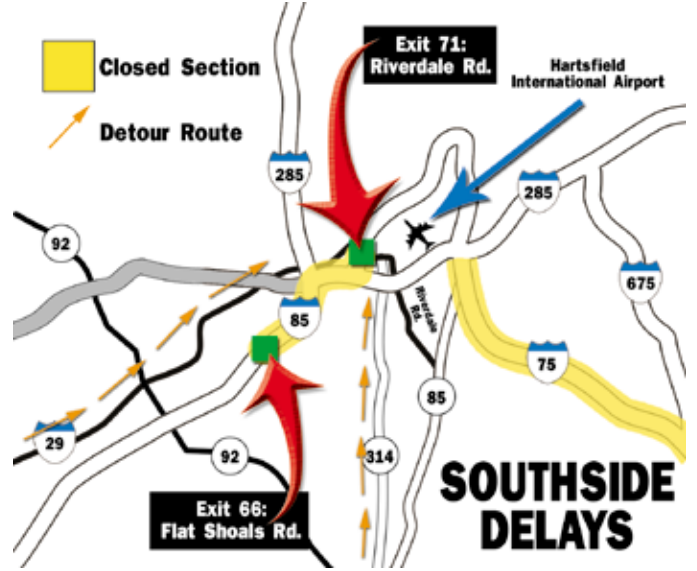

## Watson seeks new trial, cites 'errors' by judge

Attorneys representing convicted murderer Jim Watson have filed a motion seeking a new trial, alleging that several errors during last year's case prejudiced the jury.

A Fulton County jury found Watson guilty last June for the murder of his wife, Beverly Watson, whose remains were found in 1999 in a wooded area in south Fulton County. Jim Watson originally told police that his wife walked away from their home in east Fayette County on Jan. 18, 1997 and never returned.

In requesting the new trial, Jim Watson's attorneys argue that Fulton County Superior Court Judge T. Jackson Bedford should have issued a directed verdict in Watson's favor at the conclusion of evidence presented by prosecutors.

"The state succeeded at trial, not because it produced enough

## New Fayette County Schools

# Newest high school sets high bar: Best in the state

When Whitewater High School held its first open house last Thursday to welcome the Class of 2007, more than 80 percent of the charter freshman class showed up, in the middle of summer, with their moms and dads in tow.

According to Principal Greg Stillions, 380 of the 422 ninth graders who've been enrolled so far come to see what their new school, meeting this year at the LaFayette Education Center, is all about.

"If they weren't excited before they got there, they were when they left," said Stillions. "Meeting the kids last Thursday was just great," he said. "They were a very pleasant group, a very excited group. It's clear they want to be here. They were asking questions, they want to know what the new building will be like."

But it wasn't until Thursday that many of the students, drawn almost entirely from Whitewater Middle, with segments coming from Fayette and Rising Star middle schools, made this realization:

"They'll be seniors for four years," Stillions said, adding he feels confident this group of teens will be the leaders any new high school needs to get off the ground successfully.

"Things will evolve naturally," he

said. "I really don't perceive it being a situation out of control. Most of the students are excited about the challenge of being leaders from the start. And when we start going to class, that's where you're going to set expectations of what we can do as a school academically, and where we want this class to be when they are seniors."

By then, Whitewater High will have been in its permanent campus between Sarah Harry Minter Elementary and the Kiwanis Fairgrounds for three years and it will likely be at its full capacity of 1,500.

And just what will the completed WHS look like? Stillions suggests riding out Ga. Highway 54 toward Jonesboro and take a look at the new Mundy's Mill High in Clayton County. Then flip it around in your head.

"Our school is a mirror image of Mundy's Mill," the principal said.

"Starting with only one grade, that's a tremendous asset for us," said Stillions, who was principal of McIntosh before taking the Whitewater post. He helped open Clayton County's Mt. Zion High more than 10 years ago. "You're not getting anything, student-wise, who doesn't want to be here. A lot of times when you know you're going to open with 10th graders, when it comes down to starting, they don't want to go and

## Merchants ready for sales tax holidays

The blue jeans are being folded, the shirts are being hung and Tony Davis is getting ready for a big shopping weekend.

Davis, whose family owns Smith and Davis on the western edge of Fayetteville, one of Fayette's oldest clothing stores, is busy preparing his store for this weekend's tax-free shopping days.

The four-day tax-free holiday begins at 12:01 a.m. tomorrow and continues until midnight Aug. 3. The purpose of the tax-free holiday is to stimulate sales and to lessen the financial impact on parents getting their children ready to return to school.

"The first time this occurred, our business more than doubled, and we're looking forward to another busy weekend," Davis said.

Davis said he's added staff for this weekend, and is also running specials to give shoppers even more of an incentive to buy those back to school clothes this weekend. "I really think people like pulling something over on the government," he said with a laugh.

This year, the tax-free items list will be expanded and simplified to allow consumers the opportunity to purchase more products. Personal computers and personal computer accessories, such as wireless messaging devices, with a single purchase price of \$1,500 or less will be exempt and the requirement to purchase a computer base unit has been removed.

Across town at AIS Computers, near the Clayton County line, owner Tommy Turner is also looking forward to the weekend.

Turner has additional inventory added, and said he hopes to see lots of shoppers looking for back to school computers.

Items included in the personal computer exemption category are monitors, personal computer base units, keyboards, personal digital assistants, handheld computers, monitors, printers, modems, non-crackdown software and other peripheral devices. Computer and computer related accessories do not include cellphones, digital cameras, furniture and any systems, devices, software or peripherals designed or intended primarily for recreational use. School supplies bought for classroom use or classroom-related activities.

**M**idnight. Not a sound from the pavement. Suddenly an explosion of music and light reveals a larger than life landscape of felines and houses, lit by the dancing stage of a raining night. Last month, I talked about the number of restaurants leaving the county which generated a huge amount of chatter on our Web site. Since the column ran, I've heard about a number of restaurants that may soon be opening. Here's a roundup:

- **Check 44** serves location in the county in the Wilshire Pavilion Shopping Center on north Ga. Highway 74 in Peachtree City. When it opens, the restaurant will be just a stone's throw from the schools at the South Campus, which should generate more business.
- **Another Applebee's** is planned for Ga. Highway 74 and MacIuff Parkway. They're good eating in the neighborhood as long as you can avoid the traffic and congestion on the road.
- **Taco Mac's** location in Fayetteville will be the old On the Border restaurant on Ga. Highway 78. So the restaurant's Web site explains, a couple of years from Buffalo on their way to Florida in 1978 made a stop in Atlanta. After touring the city and enjoying the weather they decided to stay. They had little cash but decided to bring a popular southern cuisine to the nearby South. They found a tiny taco shack at the corner of Virginia and Highland. The business was known as Virginia Highlands.
- With limited funds a decision had to be made... interview the kitchen to change the sign out board. The kitchen was used the Mexican-style wounding name, "Taco Mac" remained. Before long, other Buffalo owners came down to help Taco Mac introduce Atlanta in Buffalo-style chicken wings. The menu includes many other great dishes but it was the spicy "wings" that had people talking and returning. The local chain now has 20 locations in Atlanta and Chattanooga.

## A new twist at an old favorite

Since it opened, I have been enjoying the pizzas of Dante's Brothers, located in Tyson in the sleeping centers on La Highway 74 near the Legacy Theatre.

The restaurant is similar to Meek's, since it offers freshly made pizzas and pastas. I think the buffalo chicken pizza is incredible, and it's also one of the few places in the county that you can find this sauce. I recently stopped by and immediately noticed that something was different. The pizzas here are not so well on the menu, but in and behind, the restaurant now features a full selection of Zesto goods. For those of you that are new to the Atlanta region, Zesto has been an extremely popular fast-food chain in Atlanta for years.

According to Wiki, pizza, the chain started out in the late 1970s with locations around the country. One of the most popular locations in Atlanta was on Peachtree Avenue. The Peachtree location was remodelled several years ago and features a lot of greenery, chrome and neon lighting.

The restaurant is known for its chicken burgers, which is simply one of the best burgers in town. The burger features two patties, cheese, mayo, mustard, ketchup, onion, lettuce, tomato and pickles. It's definitely a "cheat" meal, and requires several sips, but it's well worth the calories. Zesto also features chicken-rat ribs and the Tyson location features hot, fresh fried chicken. One of the best features of Zesto is the real ice cream used in a variety of desserts. Zesto offers many other items, such as "fish of a fish, house" Arctic cod, which is similar to Dairy Queen's Blizzard.

I've recently not a lot of choices, but all the Zesto locations are locally owned, and I have fond memories of stopping in Atlanta and grabbing a Zesto burger at the in Piedmont Blvd location, before heading on an evening of browsing magazines and books at Oxford Books. Did you know about Lent?

Why God bless you as you ponder these significant things in this significant time.

Just this past Wednesday was Ash Wednesday. For those of us who are "the good reason" to guide us through the "chubby part" of the year, this begins the season we call Lent.

Many of you have heard of Lent, and many of you "know" Lent. Consisting of 40 days before Easter, not counting the Sundays, Lent has significant and interesting history and meaning. So about this time every year I like to ask the question: "Did you know about Lent?"

The original period of Lent was 40 hours. It was spent in fasting to commemorate the suffering of Jesus. Then it became 30 days, then 36, and finally on the maps of Christianity, about 400 A.D., 40 days, not including the Sundays.

The 40 days of Lent are recognized by Christians 40 miles in the wilderness, being tempted by the devil.

The date of Lent is determined by the date of Easter. The Council of Nicea determined in 325 A.D. that Easter would be observed on the first Sunday following the 14 day of the Paschal moon.

The earliest that Lent can begin is Feb. 15, which is quite unusual. In the course of this year, Lent has a very early start. Easter is early - March 27, 2005. The latest that Lent can start is March 10. It won't be that late again until 2038.

Lent comes from the old English word for spring, "leolinn" (which means "length") with the suffix "leah" (which means "land").



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

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

## Slowing the water flow from your sprinklers

Make sure to prepare your sprinkler system for winter

Fall is just appearing, and it's time to winterize sprinklers. The annual check applies to in-ground irrigation systems only. But if you have sprinkler attachments on your outdoor, consider bringing them indoors, too.

It's best to winterize in-ground sprinklers before the first frost. A good rule of thumb is to winterize sprinklers at least by Halloween, said Tim Fure, owner of Fure's Sprinkler Service in Oak Grove in Jackson County, Mo. "Most years, that's when it starts to freeze in the area," he said. "But it can change in a day."

Residential in-ground sprinklers cost \$1,000 on average. The danger of not winterizing a system could cause broken pipes, fittings and sprinkler heads. Repair can cost hundreds of dollars.

All that didn't happen

About ten years ago my family was out walking along the country road in front of our home. My oldest daughter was only eight and she was in the lead with our dog on a leash in front of her. In a moment time seemed to slow down as many things happened at once. I saw the dog jump, my daughter scream and a huge superball striking beneath her feet. Before I had time to even utter a word, the world thickened off the road and everyone was fine.

Later that evening as I was preparing for bed, I realized that we could easily have been spending the night at the hospital or maybe even planning a funeral. Had the snake bitten my daughter, at the very least she would have had to endure many painful days recovering. Fortunately not even our dog was hurt. Instead, as I prepared for bed that night the children were all comfortably asleep in their beds, our dog was at his post guarding our home, the night was quiet and all was well except for the snake, which I shot.

Then about four years ago my son and I were in an auto accident. My little convertible was rear-ended and pushed into oncoming traffic on a busy highway. A huge truck hit us head-on. When my car finally stopped spinning, I was about to look in the passenger's seat - afraid it would be empty. Instead, my son, eyes as wide as saucers, looked back at me and began to cry. It was over for me, no injury. He had escaped the devastating accident literally without a scratch.

For weeks I was nearly sick to my stomach when I thought about what could have been. How my nine-year-old could have ended up been thrown from my car or how the truck could have run over the top of my car instead of spinning it out of the way. I thought about how my sixth grade son could have taken the brunt of the collision instead of mine or what my family might have endured if I had been killed.

I've spent much of my research time the past fifteen years examining cases where things went wrong - where people endured traumatic events like fires, rape, devastating personal injury and such. While these cases are tragic, what I have come to understand and what research is beginning to show is that a sense of gratitude helps people recover from trauma.

Gratitude was once thought to be either an ancient folk-lore from the days of slavery or something exclusive to religious. Psychologists, however, are beginning to recognize that gratitude not only helps people recover from trauma, but also helps people live happier lives. It appears that what most of our parents taught us was right. Be thankful for what you have and you will be a happier person.

We take for granted all the things that don't ever happen. All the times we arrive at our destination after a long trip without an accident, flat tire, or car trouble. We don't think much about all the illnesses our

children never catch and we take for granted all the days that they arrive safely at school and return safely home.

We take for granted that our spouses (or we often intimate) are the very people we would desperately miss if something happened to them. We fail to recognize all the trips we take to the city where we are not injured, assaulted, or harassed and we return to

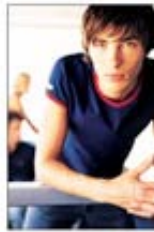

A friend stopped me one day and asked me about his seven-year daughter. It seems that she had started to question his authority and rebel against his will. Dry Eye Syndrome: the undiagnosed affliction affecting millions

FAILURE TO TREAT DRY EYE MAY CAUSE PERMANENT DAMAGE

The symptoms are common: burning, stinging, gritty irritation or dryness. Although millions suffer from the disease, many don't even know that they even have it. In fact, scientists estimate that 20 to 30 million people in the U.S. have some form of Dry Eye Syndrome. An additional nine to ten million people have moderate or severe symptoms of dry eyes.

Dry eyes can result from aging, long-term contact lens wear, LASIK surgery, diabetes, arthritis, or a dietary deficiency of omega-3s. Symptoms increase from prolonged computer use and from the dry air circulated by indoor heating and air conditioning. The syndrome is caused by a decrease in tear production or an increase in tear evaporation that makes the tears too "watery."

If left untreated, you may develop more serious problems like scarring, ulcers, or an infection of the cornea. The problem is that people don't realize the seriousness of the condition and do little for treatment.

For a child's sake

I would like to discuss with you a disconcerting issue that will not go away.

In twenty years of practice, I have noticed a troubling pattern. Among my child clients, many of them are, or have been, sexually or physically abused. Some of these children are physically abused or neglected by well-meaning parents/guardians who have used inappropriate forms of discipline. Some are simply the victims of brutal adults who don't take out their wrath on those who are helpless to defend themselves or those who selfishly pursue their own physical steps regardless of the cost.

These terms are important to this discussion: neglect, sexual abuse, and physical abuse. Neglect is failure to meet a child's basic needs (food, shelter, emotional needs, etc.). Sexual abuse is exploitation of a child, which includes fondling a child, forcing a child to watch sexual acts, intercourse with a child, and a variety of other forms of sexual contact. Physical abuse includes burning, scalding, pinching, bruising, cutting, breaking of bones, and other physical acts that injure the child either temporarily or permanently.

Several things about these victims and abusers remain consistent. Some, both sexual and physical, it is not clear how it happens in homes that are not at all violent and it happens in homes that are on welfare. It happens in minority families, in white families, in religious families, and in secular ones. Some newly abusers certainly are well-meaning, but their intentions—either legal, religious, or therapeutic. Abusers often want to stop that they started. They may sincerely apologize to children and to spouses for their behavior and they make promises that "nothing like this will ever happen again."

These promises will be broken.

Abusers may believe they have a right to engage in the acts they commit. Spouses who are aware of the abuse wish it would go away and ignoring it often seems the easiest way to deal with it. The reality of abuse is sometimes so painful to a spouse that he or she may simply refuse to believe what is obvious. Spouses often cannot bring themselves to deal with sexual or physical abuse that is being committed by the partner on a child because legal or therapeutic interventions stream forward of the head only. A bad situation, then, just worsens them to get worse.

If children survive the abuse, they grow bitter, apathetic, and are more likely to have relationship struggles as adults. They are more likely to become pregnant or sexually active and to engage in dysfunctional and abusive relationships. Abused children are more likely to abuse their own children as they

## The secrets of how to be HEALTHY

### It's all in your head

It's the key to good health all in your head? It might be.

Although most nutritionists tend to focus on improving areas below the neck, studies have shown that activities we do in strict eye coordination can be influential—or even detrimental—in the health and functioning of the brain.

"We all know by now that exercising and bad habits like smoking and not eating your meals on time and fast food," says David Perlmutter, M.D., F.A.C.N., a neurologist and author of *The Better Brain Book*. "What people may not realize is that other activities, especially those that are in the eye coordination, can be as well as the brain."

Dr. Perlmutter suggests these five tips for achieving greater physical and cerebral health.

**1. USE YOUR HEAD WHILE SHOPPING THE SUPERMARKET.**

Many health advocates for diabetes, such as low-calorie entrees and sugar-free treats—especially those found in the frozen food aisle, right next to full-fat ice cream, frozen pies and other foods that may be tempting to resist. By shopping the outer ring of your grocery store you'll find yourself buying fresh foods and eating a more brain-healthy diet. A diet considered brain healthy is one that also reduces the risk of heart disease and diabetes, encourages good blood flow to the brain and is low in saturated fat, cholesterol and calories.

Fruits and vegetables are good sources of antioxidants, which help the body neutralize harmful free radicals and enhance the process by which the brain makes its energy. The more color in the fruits and vegetables, the more antioxidants.

**2. BE MINDFUL OF TOXINS FOUND IN HEALTHY FOODS.**

Fruits, vegetables and fish are commonly considered healthy foods. However, according to U.S. government data, strawberries, peaches, apples, sweet bell peppers and imported grapes were among the produce found to have the highest levels of residue from pesticides.

Those who are routinely exposed to pesticides have a dramatically higher risk of Parkinson's disease. Look for organic fruits and vegetables whenever possible. And be sure to wash all fresh foods before eating. Certain fish, also may be somewhat high in mercury, a less-than-ideal brain toxin. Both the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and the European Food Safety Agency advise pregnant and nursing women, as well as children, to limit their fish consumption.

**3. CHANGE YOUR FAT, CHANGE YOUR BRAIN.**

Most Americans mistakenly believe that the low-fat diet is the better, but nothing could be worse for brain health. The emphasis needs to be on the type of fat we consume, not the amount.

Monounsaturated fats are naturally high in antioxidants and are commonly found in olive oil, canola oil, nuts and avocados. Polyunsaturated fats include the all-important essential fatty acids, fats that cannot be made by the body and must be obtained from food. Adequate levels of Docosahexaenoic Acid (DHA), the omega-3 fatty acid found in the brain, eyes and heart, are critical for optimal brain development and function in infants, and young brains benefit at birth. EPA has also been associated with reducing the risk for

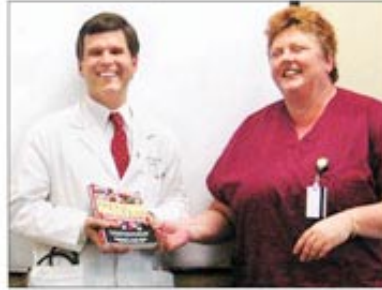
**Promoting 'Drugs for Less' at hospital, bookstore**

## When to quit

"Have you tried the piano?" How many times have you heard that? As the fall gets underway, so do the school and extracurricular activities. One of the difficult questions parents face to address is what to do if a child wants to quit an activity before its scheduled termination. Most of us recognize that it is important to teach children to follow through with activities once they begin, but we also do not want to frustrate them to the point that they hate the activity and dread the time they spend doing it.

For example, a child who is playing on an athletic team may decide mid-season that he does not want to play any longer. The dilemma for the parent is balancing the child's commitment to the team, the need to learn to follow through with a commitment even when one is not enjoying the activity, and the mental well-being of the child. I suggest several steps in making this decision regardless of whether the activity is a sport, music lesson, dancing, or some other recreational activity.

First, as always, consider the child's age. Very young children have interest in activities very quickly. Children of this age should not be allowed to even begin an activity unless they have asked about it several times. The pro-

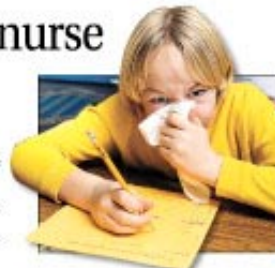
### School nurses call for cleaner classrooms

### New news on vitamin C

Long before I ever dreamed of becoming a registered dietitian, I ate my first case of nutritional deficiency. My peripartum diet of worry — a fatal disease, caused by a lack of vitamin C. I never saw his recording guns, joint pain, temporarily nerve pain in neck, hip, shoulder and "black legs." I only saw (and later his lack of energy and vigor before he died.

Over the years, I have known of just one human case of scurvy — a man who ate only canned and packaged foods where vitamin C does not reside.

Everyone gets enough vitamin C: three days, right? Wrong, according to research by registered dietitian and vitamin C researcher Carol Johnson of Arizona State University. We found more than a third of supposedly healthy college students also tested had low levels of vitamin C in their blood.

Big deal? Literally. Research by Johns Hopkins suggests that even slight deficits of vitamin C may be one reason for our continued battle with obesity.

Vitamin C affects how our body sees fat, explains Johnson. It's not!

Itch researchers begin to scratch for answers

In the great pantheon of medical complaints, give the itch. Itching looks bad. It has no colorful symptoms. It is often dismissed by researchers as the pain of absent stimuli. (The more you scratch, the more you scratch.)

Not just in the soul, but never in the skin, and some are afflicted so much that itching disrupts their lives. Dozens of triggers cause an itch, from a bite of the tiniest bug to malfunction of the body's largest internal organ, the liver.

Impalpable places in between. Along the way, the consequences to scratch can be so strong that children, dogs or even adults who should know better will claw themselves until they bleed. And sometimes for no reason.

Despite a complaint so common and so rudimentary that almost every two- and four-legged creature experiences it, medical science is still learning exactly how to cope with itching. Researchers who devote themselves to the study of itch say that many of its basic mechanisms are not well understood. They are trying to look below the surface for solutions to itching.

"We don't have any medicine for itching as good as aspirin for pain," says Dr. Jeffrey Borland of the University of Massachusetts Medical School and author of one of the fine medical textbooks devoted to the topic. "There hasn't been enough basic research in this area." Even good laboratory experiments can be tricky. Try

How much is enough?



The national trend over the past few or fifteen years that troubles me and I'm not quite sure what to do with it. Every year around this time the media publishes numbers that show how much money we are all spending during the Christmas season. It seems like every year that number gets bigger and bigger. In the U.S., many families spend more money on Christmas presents than families in other countries even in an older year. I appreciate the generosity of these families, but it leaves me wondering where it will end. When will we have spent enough?

As a child in the 1960s, I remember getting a one-dollar bill in a card for a Christmas from my grandmother. She was on a very tight budget, but she always managed to give something to each of us grandchildren - and there were a lot of us. That was enough then, and in a way I think it should also be enough now. The purpose of a parent is to show that the gift is thoughtful about the receiver. I don't believe that giving someone \$500 means you love her more than if you gave her \$20.

In a way, gift selection is a way for the giver to prove to the receiver that the giver knows the receiver well enough to pick just the right gift. The potential problem is that we don't stop with one gift. In our modern generation, we buy five, ten, or fifteen gifts for the same person. The family last year told me they opened presents from around if a.m. until lunch, took a break, and then finished after lunch. This was not a large family where does it end?

Everything we do as individuals and as a culture has meaning and our extravagance at Christmas must be communicating a message we don't want to send. While we intend to lavish our loved ones with gifts in an effort to say "I care," I think we are instead sending a message, especially to our children, that the gifts have value in themselves. They don't. They are tokens of our relationships. The more gifts we give, the more likely it is that we lose our intended meaning to the person themselves.

Maybe we are hoping that there will be a point where we will have the perfect Christmas as a Christmas where everyone will be everything like, "I got everything I wanted. Thank you!" But only a person would ever say such a thing and such a comment would have to be based on the number of presents received and would be based on the amount of money spent.

So what should we do? How do we better ourselves? First, for every present your child receives, find an old toy to give away. Second, make sure your child writes notes of thanks to all the people who gave him/her a gift. This requires them to be more thoughtful instead of just

### Regular exercise regime good for combatting depression

For people who suffer from depression, summer offers a good time for sun and exercise.

As part of the treatment of medication and counseling, physical activity is now being used to treat mental health problems such as depression. Individuals who exercise 2-3 times per week tend to have significantly less depression. "Exercise, such as walking, jogging or even gardening can significantly improve your well-being. For Manning, exercise, "You want to set simple goals, and then improve just a little bit each day. 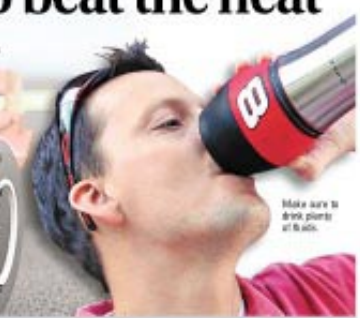

Safety tips for when you're under the sun

**W**ith longer days, warmer temperatures and an abundance of sunshine, it's no wonder so many of us take to the outdoors for summertime fun.

While it's fun to be outside for recreational activities and exercise in the summer, too much exertion can lead to serious health problems.

"When the sun gets hot and humidity rises, it is time to take precautions to avoid dangerous health consequences such as heat exhaustion, heat stroke and dehydration to the sun," says Dr. Scott Robinson, assistant professor of education at August University in Washington, D.C. and ACE-certified personal trainer.

"Seniors, children, and people with chronic illnesses are most susceptible to heat exhaustion and stroke, however, everyone is at risk. Many tell-tale symptoms and warning signs are associated with heat exhaustion, including dry mouth, fatigue, dizziness, headache, weak and rapid pulse and cool, clammy

Summer season:

- **CHECK THE UV INDEX:** Wear appropriate sunblock. Stay out of the sun from 10 a.m.-2 p.m., when temperatures and UV levels are at their peak.
- **DRINK PLENTY OF FLUIDS:** Drink enough water so that you keep yourself hydrated.
- **REMEMBER PROPER EYEWEAR:** Certain lenses can safely block UV radiation and help protect the eyes from the sun's harmful rays.
- **MAKE SURE TO COVER UP:** Wear a hat to shade the face when outdoors to bring a towel to cover your face entirely if you are going to be lying down outdoors. If you are going to be spending a long time outdoors, try to protect yourself with adequate clothing to shield yourself from the sun's rays.
- **WATCH FOR WARNING SIGNS:** Symptoms of dehydration and heatstroke include thirst, dry skin, fatigue, light-headedness, dizziness, confusion, dry mouth & throat, numbness, increased heart rate and sweating. In children, additional symptoms may include dry mouth & tongue, no tears when crying, no wet diapers for more than 3 hours, sunken abdomen, eyes or cheeks, high fever, fullness, irritability and skin that does not flatten when pinched and released.

The sun may be pleasant, but it's extremely dangerous if you don't take precautions.

She may refer to it as a "stepping stone," but Paris Bennett's stint on the hugely popular television show "American Idol" made her a household name in a matter of weeks.

At only 21, Bennett's first stint on the show was the big one: she became the first African American to win the show, and now she is stepping out with a brand new album less than a year after her elimination from "Idol."

During the three rounds of semifinals, when two girls and two boys were eliminated each week, Bennett showed off her performance skills and vocal talent with a performance of the song "Mighty Like to Gettin' on" as well as "I'ma Be a Star (When I Grow Up)" and "Young."

Once the contestants had been whittled down to six girls and six boys, it was time for the finals. Bennett performed "I'll Be" on the stage Monday through night and won over 100 million votes from the judges. Judge Simon Cowell even called her "Perfection."

Over the next several weeks, Bennett continued to impress audiences and the judges alike and demonstrated her range with performances of Prince & the New Power Generation's "Love, Symbolic" and country great Loretta Lynn's "Fixin' to Die," and she surprised audiences with her first rocker when she belted "The Whole Mar-a-Che" by Queen.

Although Bennett, who entered the exclusive Princess P as a child, was declared a winner a long time ago, she made her exit from the show at a very respectable 5th place on May 5, 2006. Her time on the "American Idol" stage in Los Angeles was over.

**M**artha Knight, a resident at Heritage of Peachtree Retirement & Assisted Living, celebrated her 100th birthday with a party on Sunday, October 8 surrounded by family, friends and the staff and fellow residents at Heritage.

"We had nothing and we needed nothing," said Knight, recalling her happy, early childhood. What a difference 100 years makes in the "United States!"

Martha Ellen Dilly and her twin sister, Mary Elizabeth, the last of six children, entered the world October 8, 1906, in the town of Douglas in the wooded hills

of western Pennsylvania. The twins were blessed with parents who, through strict family education, believed in education and progress, love and protection. Poverty was the norm of the day in this small community. The family moved to Altoona and then, through better writing in Cosveltville, Pennsylvania in 1914.

The older brother once described little Martha as "robust and impetuous." "The children made up their own games — blind man's bluff, hide and seek, jump rope and such, and the girls played with china-ware dolls, gifts from their aunts. They had a dog and a cat, but Martha loved all animals especially the wild critters brought home by her brother such as snakes, skunks, raccoons

and rabbits even today her favorite TV programs are on the Animal Planet. The twins depended on their mother's sewing skills for their clothing and had no more bought clothes until they were 14.

While the brothers managed to attend college, there was no similar opportunity for the sisters. Nevertheless, in 1926, Knight became an elementary teacher in a one-room schoolhouse. She worked three miles to work and earned \$75 a month. She took her driving test on a Model T Ford, the "Tin Lizzie," and there was able to drive it in school when it either had to be cranked by her students or pushed up the hill on snowy days.

In 1928 she went to work at the power company where her twin was employed. One evening, while Knight was in bed with the flu, both Knight, the new stu-

## New Georgia Aquarium opens to the public

**T**oday marks a historic day for Atlanta: the new Georgia Aquarium opens to the public.

The aquarium is the largest in the world "with over 8 million gallons of fresh and marine water and 300,000 animals representing 500 species from around the globe," boasts the aquarium's website.

The Fairburn resident, James Gichrist, it means more than just a new attraction or entertainment arena within a short drive. For him, it means a new job.

Gichrist, he first knew as Sergeant "Scuba," in one of his hands-down volunteer dives.

When Gichrist was a teenager he began free diving. For them began using a snorkel and mask on his dives. He had participated in the SEAL program at his high school all four years and he knew that he wanted to "see the world and experience a few things"

to be clean and the animals healthy. Gichrist was chosen out of a pool of 500 applicants through a series of interviews, background checks, physical fitness and diving tests. This intensive army man recalls that applying to dive for the aquarium was "a lot of pressure as entering military service."

Gichrist's military experience includes the trips to the army, Fort in Blvd, Charleston, or any number of Atlantic ocean beaches, but Gichrist would take him to each year. "We would go down there and play with big sand tigers or sharks, they would come and swim around you in the water. When it was normal, we had rock spray - and I have never been hit or scared by an animal while in the water."

"This is a remarkable statement when you take into account that Gichrist has spent much of his life at the ocean, swimming with fish or other ocean life. But he still makes the average swimmer."

## Fayetteville resident wins scholarship, studies abroad

I was just over a year ago that 20-year-old Jennifer Thayer, a Fayetteville resident, applied for the scholarship which would take her to Spain for the month of June.

The trip meant more to her than a summer vacation, however. The experience also helped the second-year Gordon College student decide what career path she wanted to pursue. As a freshman at the Fayetteville, Ga. school, Thayer had two years of high school Spanish and only one semester of college-level Spanish under her belt when her college Spanish professor encouraged her to apply for the Charles South Study Abroad Scholarship. The scholarship is awarded to students who have demonstrated a commitment to academic excellence and was endorsed by Fayetteville's mayor at the time of her last birthday.

The scholarship gives students \$300 toward a study abroad program in Barcelona, Spain. Although the scholarship is only a portion of the total trip expense, which cost Thayer

approximately \$4,500 in all, she says that the scholarship "definitely helped." Only two students were selected to receive the scholarship in 2005, Thayer and Cassie Case of Mt. Dora.

Thayer is the daughter of Randall and Carla Thayer and is the oldest of their three children. She is a 2003 graduate of Hart's Mill High School and both she and her younger sister, who is now a freshman at Gordon, live at home and commute to school. "I always wanted to go to a small school," says Thayer. Living at home allows her to help out around the house, and more importantly her two younger siblings grow up.

Thayer flew to Spain, along with 30 other students from all over Georgia, on May 20, 2005. "The first couple of days were really hard," says Thayer, although she does say she felt "well prepared going into the trip."

The students went to class from 9:30 a.m. until 2 p.m., Monday through Friday. "It was an intensive program," Thayer explains. "The teacher spoke in Spanish all the time." During the week, students took part in class excursions to cultural sites such as museums and cathedrals around Barcelona.

When they left the classroom for the day, students headed back to the homes of their host families who were native Spaniards. Thayer was placed in the home of a woman named Lola and shared a room with a student from Stone Mountain. "You had to communicate with your host parents and understand them," she said. "It was very good. You really have to speak Spanish while you are there."

Thayer and her roommate became part of their host's family, eating what they ate and doing what they did. She says she was unsure of whether she would like the food, "so I packed a lot of American junk food in my suitcase." As it turns out, she says she had a lot of fun, including eating the junk which was "really good," she said. "I loved the food over there," Thayer
